Greetings Bardstown Road Presbyterian Church,

I shared this with session and will share with all of you that I will be writing the final six 2021 devotions (Dec 26-31, 2021), and the closing short essay, for *These Days; Daily Devotions for Living by Faith*. Some of you read these devotions daily, a devotional published quarterly by the Presbyterian Publishing Company, our denomination's publisher based here in Louisville. It is an honor and privilege to write for *These Days*, and I look forward to seeing what I finish up these next few days.

I share this with you as what I am being asked to do here is pertinent to the life of the church. This small writing project asks something of me that many pastors and leaders of the church face - thinking about one season of the life of the church while trying to be present to the church season that we are currently in. This writing project asks me to think about the completion of the next 2021 Advent Season, post-Christmas, potentially and hopefully post-covid, and how several slices of scripture might be resonating in our world at that time. I find that after this past year this feels to me no small task. Volumes have been written about what we are all going through emotionally, spiritually, physically, psychologically, mentally, and literally. To break all that down into a small hundred and fifty words is my task at hand. There is so much to say. There are so many emotions being felt.

I have truly enjoyed walking with you through the five phrases of the Mission Statement of Bardstown Road Presbyterian Church the five Sundays of Lent as we head in to Palm Sunday, Holy Week, and Easter. I am charged to think about the turn from 2021 to 2022, but I would ask all of us to stay in the here and now as much as we are able. I would ask that we don't get ahead of ourselves in asking 'what is the moral of the covid story?' I would ask that we take what the world is offering one day at a time. I would ask us as a church to continue to ask, and to seek, and to knock where we are called to be each day. Although I see great hope in many of the positive paths that are moving us forward, such as the fact that we are pushing close to 50 vaccinated folks in our family of around 100 members and participants, let's seek each day to be present to where God is asking us to be present. It has been a gift for me to be your pastor during times unimaginable for most of us. May we remain in the moment of continuing to support one another as we exit Lent into the seasons of Easter Spring and Summer.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM MARCH 21 SESSION MTG •

- The Session Retreat reviewed Chapter 3 about transforming partnership from the book 'Neighborhood Church'. Various ways to connect with others through the use of our building and parking lot were discussed.
- Rev. Eldred proposed the idea of partnering with Westwood Presbyterian Church for his Moderator's Report. The idea came from the sermon by Angela Johnson, the minister at Grace Hope Presbyterian Church, during the worship at the last Presbytery meeting. She challenged churches to "each one, reach one". Rev. Eldred has contacted Westwood and they are considering what form this relationship could be.
- The passing of Sarah Collins on February 19, 2021 was acknowledged and her relationship with our church. Rev. Eldred has contacted her cousin, Bert Collins, about a future memorial service.
- A memorial non-restricted bequest from the Shoemaker Family has been designated to fund the Memorial Chapel at Cedar Ridge Camp. Grad Shoemaker had worked on building and repairing the cabins at Cedar Ridge.
- Repairs to the boiler heating system will be expensive and will be done when the system can be shut down. The sanctuary will be cool, so members will need to dress warm for in-person services.
- The following dates for 'Standing for Solidarity' were approved for March 22, March 29, April 12, April 26, May 10 and May 24. All are welcome to meet in front of the church from 5:00 to 6:00 P.M.
- Jennie Guelda is getting the nursery ready for Palm Sunday and Easter in-person services. The All Church Retreat is tentatively scheduled for September 18, 2021 at Cedar Ridge Camp.
- The Personnel Committee is reviewing the Policies and Procedures for the church. Lin Block-Coalter prepared the current document eleven years ago and it will be revised to be applicable to the church's needs.
- Gabe Vanamburgh and Ivona Nijimbere are the two graduating high school seniors in the confirmation class and their confirmation is scheduled for Pentecost Sunday May 23. Easter baskets will be prepared for the youths.
- Alicia Bloos attended a meeting by Zoom about pollinator gardens so we can maintain our present garden by the parking lot. Some of the 'Grab and Go' pantries at nearby churches have been abused, but an installation at our church is still under consideration.
- The Stewardship Committee needs a chairperson to lead the fundraising for the 2022 budget. "Could this be you"? Stewardship Sunday will be on All Saints Day.
- The Video Tech Team will be supported by the Communications Committee. The team members being trained by Doug Rapp are: Anne Campbell, Paul Johnson, Sarah Hageman, Gillian Hollis Kraus-Neale, Neil and Becky Johnson.

- Palm Sunday will include the traditional walk down Bardstown Road distributing palm leaves before the service. Rev. Eldred will provide instructions.
- There will be no communion served on Easter in the Sanctuary for it would be a logistical nightmare. Attendees will be asked to have a temperature check, to spread apart, wear masks, and the hymns will be hummed instead of sung for the inperson services.

It was **a great success in helping replenish dwindling food reserves, but need continues** to be great in our community. Alwaysneeded items include meaty soups and stews, crackers, cheese and crackers, meaty pasta sauce with pasta, canned meat and tuna, mac and cheese, shelf-stable milk, canned green beans, toilet paper, bar soap, shampoo. Also desperately needed: laundry pods and dish detergent. HCM can give out 4 or 5 laundry pods at a time (instead of a whole package), and the small dish detergent bottles are preferred, as HCM can get more donated and spread the love farther than with fewer big or xlarge bottles.
