Dear Siblings in Christ,

The moment almost felt to me like New Year's Eve - as the song goes - "should auld acquaintance be forgot and never brought to mind? Should auld acquaintance be forgot and days of auld lang syne?" I set about to clean a small Smokey Joe Grill that had never really been used but that had made the cut in our pairing down of possessions for the move to Louisville in 2019. I had read about the practice, but had never participated. Many clergy people and churches burn their leftover dried palms from the year prior to be used as ashes on Ash Wednesday. Some do it the morning of that day as an annual ritual; a start to their day of recognizing the beginning of Lent. Having never burned old palms before, I settled on a more private attempt at my home in my driveway in hopes that our 2021 dried palms could be our 2022 Ash Wednesday ashes.

It was cathartic, to say the least. The flame started small and slow. I didn't think it would sustain itself, and then all of a sudden there was a burst of sudden heat and intensity. The smoke didn't know which way to dance as the subtle wind presented itself multi-directionally as it can be this time of year in Kentucky. As the palms burned to ashes, I thought of our community and the many things that so many have been through this past year. I witnessed a burst of flame reduce what was quite an abundant batch of palms down to a relatively small amount of ashes. I didn't know that it took that much palm to make the ashes that we use on Ash Wednesday. It takes a fair amount to create such a small amount.





I wondered what I was supposed to be gleaning from all of this? What was this transformation of dried palms to ashes supposed to represent, if anything? I entered in to this process purely logistically and functionally; in that we needed ashes for Ash Wednesday, and that maybe I would save the church a few dollars by making my own. I didn't expect to be moved by this process, unlike any bonfire or campfire that I have experienced in my life. I thought ahead to these palms that were laid down over mud so that Jesus could pass through for his last time to Jerusalem on what will be our Palm Sunday, April 10. I remembered the verse from Genesis 3:19 "Remember you are from dust and to dust you shall return". And I thought to myself that maybe next year we will do this in the church parking lot, and offer impromptu prayer for the past year? Creating meaningful ritual is such a part of our worship. Let us continue to seek meaning in our day to day lives, and in all the wonders that we encounter.

LIVING WATERS: Living Waters for the World is a project of the Synod of Living Waters, of which Mid-Kentucky Presbytery is a part. Jeff Wagner, a long-time member of BRP, is now the Director of Operations for the world, including the US, and has installed over a thousand water purification systems in low-income and rural areas. Their motto is, "All of God's Children Need Clean Water.'

BRP's Session has voted to send \$5,000 to Living Waters out of the Mission Bequest Fund. This fund contains money that was set aside from the church's Restricted Funds to be used specifically for mission-related work, and it allows the church to spend money on special projects that fall outside the church's regular operating budget.

EARTH CARE: BRP is an Earth Care Congregation-again! Thanks to the efforts of Alicia Bloos, Bill Bowman, and Mark Eldred, the application to be accepted as an Earth Care Congregation was approved by Presbyterian Headquarters in February. We highlighted our work on the pollinator garden next to the parking lot, our support for the Farmers Market, and our efforts to minimize the use of paper in our communications. Many of our activities were curtailed due to the pandemic, but we hope to resume those environmental activities once the pandemic recedes.

We have a nice Certificate from the PC(USA) to show our status as an Earth Care Congregation, and we have been honored for achieving this status for more than 10 years!

HIGHLIGHTS March 15, 2022 SESSION MEETING

- Rev. Eldred mentioned in his Moderator's Report of burning palm leaves for ashes to use on Ash Wednesday and the joint service with Covenant Community Church.
- The Tri-Presbytery Meeting at Bowling Green P.C. was reviewed by Keith Clements. Mid-Kentucky Presbytery moved to approve submitting the Fossil Fuel Divestment Overture to the 225th PCUSA General Assembly. The Overture directs the PCUSA to divest their investments that contribute to greenhouse gases plus production of plastics, and increase investments in renewable energy. Our church and Crescent Hill P.C. will present his overture to G.A.
- Steam pipe repairs have been done in the women's lounge and basement. Additional work is planned this summer. The replacement of the entire heating system is not feasible.
- A Motion was approved to add \$75,000 to the Building and Grounds Maintenance Reserve Fund. This money from the Collins' bequest would be used for current and deferred maintenance work.
- \$5,000 was approved to donate to Living Waters for the World which would come from the Mission Bequest Fund. Bill Bowman had done a Minute for Mission on Living Waters.
- Our church received another 10+ years of certification as an Earth Care Congregation for Environmental Stewardship.
- Carol Brees will share our Justice and Faith Table with Presbyterian Disaster Assistance at the April 2 Farmer's Market. There will be another Red Cross Blood Drive on April 23 from 9:00 A.M. to 1:00 P.M. in Fellowship Hall.
- The February Budget Statement showed a positive year to date balance of \$7,120 due to several members having paid their 2022 pledge for the total year.
- The Jubilee Fund that is designated to be used by the pastor and treasurer for assisting church members in need will be replenished from the recent bequests.
- The Dreams with Wings Summer Camp has decided to return to their previous location due to their increased enrollment and easier access into their building.
- The HCM sponsored Beargrass Media Video Camp on June 13 to 17 organized by Patrick Fitzgerald was approved.
- Vacation Bible School is planned this summer on three Sunday afternoons (June 5, July 10, and August 7). These programs will be an intergenerational mission event in collaboration with Immanuel UCC.
- The youth will be meeting after the Sunday service for Sunday School with the young and older kids participating together as a "One Room School House." The older youth will be preparing for confirmation and Maddie Vanamburgh is leading the older group. Carol Brees and Clare Lewis will assist with activities.

- The Adult Education class will begin April 3 led by Rev. Mark Eldred and Rev. Bill Williamson studying the book, "The Art of Dying Well" for a 6-week study.
- Members of the Finance Committee (Marty, Doug and Clare) will be meeting individually with each committee to discuss their financial needs and opportunities to accomplish projects that previously were not possible.
- The chances of hosting an LPTS student for Field Education this fall are slim due to the small enrollment in the M. of Divinity at the seminary and many are students of another denomination.
- The policy of wearing masks during worship services will be optional as per CDC recommendations was approved. This situation could change if the Covid positivity rates go back up.
- Coffee Hour will begin starting Sunday March 20. Requests for preparing the coffee and providing doughnuts will be made.
- PCUSA Presbyterian Mission correspondence acknowledged receipt of financial support for all 4 special offerings and \$2,200 for Disaster Relief Assistance in 2021.
- CLOUT (Citizens of Louisville Organized and United Together) is an organization of churches to address social justice concerns. Several church members will be attending a meeting in person and by Zoom on March 28 to review Crime and Violence, Community Safety and Views of Mayoral Candidates.
- "The Mid-Kentucky Calling " weekly email newsletter will highlight our congregation for prayers on March 22. Rev. Eldred asked anyone to submit any prayer requests to share with the Presbytery.
- The Session retreat at Camp Cedar Ridge will be Saturday, July 16 with lunch and activities. There will be no Session Meeting in July, (Sabbath Session Month).
