Dear Siblings in Christ,

Like God and faith, there is something slightly miraculous about this amaryllis below. It was gifted to me by one of you in December of 2019 - my first Christmas here - two months after I had started. It was one of those boxed plant starter kits that comes with the pot, the bulb, the soil, and some simple instructions. Being new, that first six months were busy ones, and I never took the time to plant the bulb. Sometime around my first summer here I believe I planted the bulb - summer of 2020. I had saved a poinsettia from that first Christmas Eve, and during the first few months of this new word and situation we all had learned, Covid-19, I thought my office could use a little something special.

To this day, I do not know who gave me this gift. It was just in the church administration office beside my door sometime around Christmas with some other gifts that some of you fine folks had given me. That first spring of 2021 the bulb did not flower. I had all these very nice green leaves, but no flower. Those of you who have tried to keep orchids might know what I am referring to with the nice green leaves but no flowers. Orchids can be a challenging flower between blooms.

The following spring I noticed something happening to the beautiful bright green leaves. They were fading one by one and dying off. I read up on the amaryllis, and was advised to cut the leaves off at a certain point. Out from the center of the pot grew this enormous base of a stem. I watched it grow and grow and grow, checking google to see what was to happen next. March of 2022, the amaryllis burst with life and the four massive red flowers bloomed two at a time in about a 48-hour period. In our second year of Covid-19, the amaryllis gave me some well needed inspiration and life.

Fast forward to 2023 - I watched the leaves die one by one again, and right at exactly one year the amaryllis has bloomed again. As we head toward Holy Week and Easter, I hope that you, too, are noticing the hope that God's creation, Mother Earth, gives us each and every year in the newness and vibrancy of spring. I still do not know who gave me this gift, yet I have an educated guess. It continues to teach me much about life, God, and the cycle of nature that brings life. Whoever gave it to me, I am thankful to you for the many lessons that I continue to learn as your Pastor.

MISSION (cont.) CLOUT

CLOUT (Citizens of Louisville Organized and United Together) is an organization of many churches around the Louisville area, helping members of those churches be more involved in social issues around the city. Examples of recent CLOUT initiatives are in the areas of policecommunity relations, addressing crime and violence, affordable housing, addressing the "school-to-prison pipeline," and helping older adults age in place.

Jennie Guelda and Margot Tomsen have attended many CLOUT meetings and have met with CLOUT staff persons. They invite all BRP members to come to a "town hall" meeting after church on **Sunday, May 7 at noon.** After lunch that afternoon, we'll hear a brief explanation of what CLOUT does and begin listing areas of concern that churches may be able to address. Are there particular concerns that BRP members would like the larger organization to study and address?

The BRP Session is considering joining CLOUT as a member congregation, and having all of us aware of the organization and what it does will help determine what the Session will do.

RIP MEDICAL DEBT

Medical debt is a big problem in the United States. Millions of Americans rack up so much debt over medical bills that they fall below the poverty line, and their lives are upended. Fortunately, there's a nonprofit called RIP Medical Debt that tries to address these problems. This nonprofit buys up debt for about a penny on the dollar and forgives that debt, allowing its beneficiaries to get back on their feet again.

Mid-Kentucky Presbytery has allocated some funds to make a donation to this nonprofit, and it's challenged congregations to do the same. The BRP Session has responded to the challenge by pledging \$2,000 to go to the Presbytery, to be added to the funds from other congregations and the Presbytery funds, and RIP Medical Debt will forgive the debt of thousands of people in the Kentuckiana area.

The Session asks that BRP members also consider making a direct donation to the nonprofit, through their website *ripmedicaldebt.org*. Together, church members, church funds, and Presbytery funds can help thousands of our neighbors!

HIGHLIGHTS March 2023 SESSION MEETING

- Rev. Eldred said he appreciated having the congregation coming forward for receiving communion and the trays passed for the offering during the service.
- Dreams With Wings will be presenting a cabaret show in Fellowship Hall on Monday March 27 at 5:00 P.M. which is open to the congregation to attend.
- Keith Clements reported on the Mid-Kentucky Presbytery Meeting at Second Presbyterian Church on February 25, 2023. Our 2020 and 2021 Session Meeting Minutes were approved, and Rev. Eldred, Alicia Bloos and Keith Clements attended Leadership Education Workshops before the meeting. A new worship mission plan was approved for the New Goshen Church site.
- The entrance canopy is completed with the lighting and "Welcome" sign installed. The framing will be painted after the wood is cured.
- A transfer letter of membership for John and Peggie Elgin has been received from First Presbyterian Church, Aiken, S. C. The clerk will acknowledge the request for transfer with a responding letter.
- The monthly income is ahead of expenses for February and all the annual prepay obligations have been paid. The balance difference of -\$4,984 for the year is due to extensive boiler and piping repairs.
- Two mini-split heating/cooling units will be installed in • the kitchen and administration office with funding from the Capital Improvements budget.
- A review of the condition of the boiler heating system will be done in May when the system is shut down.
- The Kentucky Home School will have new leadership • next school year and has been using the second floor of • the church on Tuesdays from 9:00 A.M. to 2:30 P.M. They are planning to use the building on Tuesdays and Thursdays starting Winter of 2024. Due to the change in the organization there will be a meeting with the group to review their use of the space and policies.
- A Tai Chi class, led by Kay Begley, has requested to use Fellowship Hall on Thursdays from 3:30 to 4:30 P.M. Their request was approved contingent on them getting a consent waiver for liability.
- The youth have been busy with Oriverye Nintije trying out for a football team and Justin on a soccer team. To help Sarah Hageman, volunteers are needed to take the EASTER LILIES kids to practices and games.
- Our church has been designated an Earth Care • Congregation for 2023. Alicia Bloos was thanked for preparing the application.
- Rev. Cheryl Barnes will do a Minute for Mission about her World Mission work in Malawi at the March 26 Sunday service and will discuss it further during the potluck luncheon that follows.

- Jennie Guelda and Margot Tomsen will attend the CLOUT Nehemiah gathering on March 27. Following that meeting our church will have a townhall gathering May 7 with the congregation to consider any social justice issues we would like to propose to CLOUT.
- The pollinator garden will spring to life with a seed swap on April 15 and weeding, cultivating, and planting the garden on April 22 (Earth Day).
- The RIP Medical Debt proposal sponsored by Mid-Kentucky Presbytery is intended to eliminate medical debt for those in need in our community. Churches are requested to contribute to this campaign. Our church approved donating \$2,000 from the Mission Bequest Fund with the request that the Presbytery increase their funding.
- Bread for the World Sunday will be April 16 with a Minute for Mission and an offering of letters of support to congressmen on April 30.
- The Faith and Justice Table at the Farmer's Market will resume with Community Grocery on April 1 and Bread for the World on May 13.
- Highlands Community Ministries raised over • \$7,000 at the Mardi Gras fundraiser.
- The Permanent Nominating Committee will be asking for suggestions from the congregation for a person to serve on the Session for the Class of 2026.
- The Easter Breakfast in the park will be at the smaller pavilion (Stegner) near Hogan's Fountain on April 8. Since there are no grills available, there will be no cooked meat. Casseroles and quiches are encouraged to be served.
- Donations are requested for Easter Lilies and ecopalms will be used on Palm Sunday.
- The church approved to be in solidarity with the • other HCM churches that are partnering with Highlands Community Ministries to support the Drag Revival with a donation of \$250.00.
- There was a thoughtful discussion about the extent our church should support LGBTQ inclusivity to become an open and welcoming congregation. This conversation will continue.

We will be ordering Easter lilies through the Kentuckiana Chapter of the National Hemophilia Foundation again this year. The cost is \$10.75. Please place your orders as soon as possible.

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Advocating to End Hunger Offering of Letters April 30, 2023

"..But he (Jesus) answered, "You give them something to eat." -Mark 6:37 (NIV) Feeding the hungry is becoming more difficult in recent days. We are all seeing rising prices in the grocery stores, and at the beginning of March SNAP benefits (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program aka food stamps) were cut back to pre-pandemic levels.

Bread for the World (<u>www.bread.org</u>) is an interdenominational Christian group that advocates for policies to help end hunger, both at home and abroad.

This year, a major focus for Bread for the World is the Farm Bill. This is a piece of legislation that has to be renewed every five years and is up for vote in September, 2023. The Farm bill governs both US and global agriculture and food policy and programs. About 75% of SNAP funding is through the Farm Bill, as well as several important international food aid programs.

Bread for the World is requesting we write our senators and representatives in support of renewing the Farm Bill. They also request we support increasing the nutritional aspect of the program, by measures such as increasing access to fresh produce in the SNAP program. They also support equity in dealing with both food aid recipients and food producers. Sustainability is also important, as growing practices must be sustainable in this time of climate change.

Because hand-written letters are preferred, the Mission Committee is hosting an Offering of Letters after worship on April 30. We will provide, pens, paper, and pizza! We will also provide templates and bullet points to consider. These letters will be collected and delivered with a cover letter to the offices of Sen. Mitch McConnell, Sen. Rand Paul, and Rep. Morgan McGarvey. If you live in a different district, please write to your own Representative as well.
