I find hope in our ability to hold powerful and challenging conversations about our faith and lives. I find hope in the way that people not only say that they care but show it in this community. I find hope in your persistence. I find hope in a church willing to stand on our street, outside in public, and hold a sign that says 'hate has no home here!!'. I find hope in literally seeing in peoples' eyes the lament and seeing their energy in showing up the hope that they know they will find in the laughter, love, and smiles of their church community. As your pastor, it is a blessing to literally be able to feel the energy of our sanctuary change as each of you enter it. I mention this from time to time to our Music Director Jeanie Grosz just before a service, I say "Jeanie, can you feel the energy in here?" It is a very real thing. That is the Holy Spirit. It cannot be fabricated. It is a blessed and powerful thing that we get to share in the presence of one another and with God. We press in to 2022 together, blessed in community and in God.



NOVEMBER 23, 2021 SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

- Rev. Mark Eldred shared his study leave experience in Bloomington Indiana at the 'Year B' of the New Pastor Credo Program that was sponsored by the PCUSA Board of Pensions. Its purpose was to support sustainable health in all areas of the clergy vocation.
- -Keith Clements Reported on the November 20 hybrid Mid
 -Kentucky Presbytery Meeting at Harvey Browne. The
 consent agenda included approval of the officers for 2022,
 an overture to the 225th General Assembly for restoration
 of the position of Parrish Associate to the Book of Order
 and the First Reading the undocketed new business be
 submitted at least 48 hours before a stated meeting.
- -Marty Hageman stated that "we are in the black" with a year-to-date balance of \$6,626. The Stewardship campaign did well, raising a total commitment of pledges of \$118,400 for 2022.
- A request by Patrick Fitzgerald to hold a Video Camp on December 28 and 29 in Fellowship Hall and two 2nd floor rooms was approved.
- There will be a Congregational Meeting on December 5 following the Sunday service to review and approve the Terms of Call for Rev. Mark Eldred and elect a Treasurer for 2022.
- The Christian Education Committee has been preparing Advent packages which include art supplies for the youth.
- Bill Bowman reported in place of Carol Brees, who is recovering from a hip operation, that we will have our Justice and Faith table at the Farmer's Market on December 4. Clare Lewis will represent our church along with Vince Patton of the Advisory Board of the PCUSA Hunger Program.
- -Anne Campbell reported for the Congregational Life Committee that there will be a Women's Circle meeting at Masonic Homes on December 14.
- Clare Lewis and Alicia Bloos, with the Administration Committee, are working on updating our church website.
 The Advent/Christmas dates are on the calendar, and they need information on the staff and from the committees.
- -Keith Clements reported that the church will participate in Bardstown Road Aglow on Saturday December 4 from 6:00 to 8:00 P.M. The church will be closed to the public and volunteers will be serving hot drinks and bagged cookies from the patio.
- Reporting Worship and Music, Anne Campbell said that the Advent banners made by Beverly Gradisek are ready to be installed in the Sanctuary. New bibles with larger font are on order. The themes for the Wednesday Advent dinners are as follows: December 1- Recipes and food; December 8 – Music and singing; and December 15 – Family traditions.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE DECEMBER 14, SESSION MEETING

 -During the Moderator's report, Rev. Eldred reviewed plans for the Advent season and his role in the Social Witness Policy Program which will be reported to the PCUSA General Assembly next summer.

- -LLester Gamble commented about how the congregation should follow the procedure of getting things done by bringing their ideas to the committee's leadership so that matters can be considered by the Session as a group.
- -The Session approved having Keith Clements serve as Clerk of Session for 2022.
- A preliminary review of the proposed 2022 budget with a commentary report of income and expenses was made by the Session. Questions were raised if our budget reflects our core values and as we return to pre-pandemic spending will the congregation notice?
- -LLester Gamble requested more people to help on the Building and Grounds Committee. The Time and Talents responses will be reviewed for assistance with maintenance and a work-day is planned for early 2022.
- -A request by Carol Brees to host a baby shower for her daughter-in-law on January 8 in Fellowship Hall was approved.
- Kentucky Refugee Ministries will be sponsoring a refugee group for Immanuel Church of Christ and our church to assist with setting up the households and staples.
- There will be a final workday on January 8 and dedication on January 15 for the Habitat house our church has been working on.
- -Jennie Guelda volunteered to be at our Faith and Justice Table at the Farmer's Market on January 8.
- -Clare Lewis and Alicia Bloos are updating the church website removing outdated information and utilizing new technology
- Our 10-year-old refurbished copier/printer is malfunctioning with continuing repair problems. The Administration Committee was approved to replace the equipment either by leasing or purchasing. They will obtain quotes for a new copier for the Session to review.
- The Administration Committee will be preparing the Annual Report for 2021. They will be requesting activity reports from each committee.
- -The Session approved having the Annual Meeting of the Congregation on February 20, 2022, to review and approve the Annual Report.
- -Marty Hageman will tabulate and make copies of the Time and Talent survey responses which are due at the end of the year.
- Reporting for the Outreach Committee, Rev. Eldred said that Bardstown Road Aglow was a success with a good interaction with people. All of our cookies were given away and the hot drinks were consumed.

- July at Cedar Ridge Camp. Topics for discussion will be the church budget, building maintenance and committee responsibilities.
- -A motion was made approving the salaries for the church staff be increased by 3% for 2022 as recommended by the Personnel Committee.

ADULT EDUCATION

We hope and pray that Covid-19 Omicron allows us to gather for these Adult Education offerings but please know that we may need to switch any and all of these gatherings to zoom only.

The Lost Art of Dying - L.S. Dugdale, M.D. I don't know a single person in our congregation that hasn't experienced, or isn't currently experiencing, grief in some way, shape, or form. Rev. Bill Williamson approached me about a book titled *The* Lost Art of Dying; Reviving Forgotten Wisdom written by a medical doctor L.S. Dugdale, M.D. It is based on an age old written literary artifact called the Ars Moriendi - "The Art of Dying" - from the 15th Century. Bill and I would like to invite any and all to a five-week conversation about Dugdale's book, Sundays after church, January 9, 16, 23, 30, and February 6. If in person gatherings are not comfortable for you, please reach out to me and we can see about a second group that meets virtually.

The New Jim Crow - Michelle Alexander Our second offering of three Adult Ed gatherings will be to read and study Michelle Alexander's The New Jim Crow - a book often referred to in justice conversations in our nation. Alexander's work emerged in 2010 on the front end of many conversations that we have to this day regarding race, daily life, and a life in faith driven by a God who asks us continually to seek justice, love kindness, and to walk humbly with our God. What does seeking justice mean in the life of individual and corporate faith? This book is a challenging read during a most continued challenging time in our nation and world. If Covid doesn't restrict in person meetings, we will gather after church services Sundays Feb 20, 27, March 6, 13, 20, 27 and April 3 (Justice Advocacy Sunday). There will be a weeknight zoom gathering for this book reading with dates and times tbd.

Katie's Canon - Rev. Dr. Katie Geneva Cannon

The Session Retreat for 2022 will be either in June or Adult Ed will break for two weeks to gather for Palm Sunday, Holy Week, and Easter - we will return to our third book study reading Katie's Canon by the late Rev. Dr. Katie Geneva Cannon - a womanist theologian and the first black woman to be ordained in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Katie's voice will resonate in juxtaposition to the long tradition of male theologians who held primarily control of the theological narrative for hundreds of years. Join after church Sundays April 24, May 1, 8, 14, and 22. There will be a weeknight zoom gathering for this book reading with dates and times tbd.

WHAT IS PER CAPITA?

Per capita is an amount of money per member (this year, \$25) that our congregation pays to our larger Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). This money is part of the glue that holds Presbyterians together. It is the money that enables us to work with other Presbyterian churches in our presbytery and across the country. It is also money that allows us to work with other churches to further the mission of Jesus Christ around the world.

For example, your per capita pays for the General Assembly meeting every two years (including 2022) where Presbyterians gather together to worship and discern the mind of Christ for the church. It also pays for sharing the gospel worldwide through cooperation with other denominations. Plus, these

pay for annual training events for presbytery executives, stated clerks, and others who help lead our work and mission.

When you contribute your portion of the per capita amount (\$25 per active member), you can free up dollars in our regular budget for the work of our congregation in this community. Just make your check payable to BRP with "per capita" written on the memo line.
