Greetings Church,

I want to thank all of you for a wonderful Holy Week and Easter. We have had many opportunities to gather in worship and fellowship. Louisville has had a rough go these past weeks with the national news of several more mass shootings here in our city. Barely out of the glee of Easter and "He is Risen", we regathered to pray, mourn loss, acknowledge despair, and share in grief.

The following Sunday, you heard me mention from the pulpit that I would be taking a day off Wednesday, April 12, to attend my first Louisville Bats game of the year - a day of Sabbath and rest after a very busy Holy Week and week following given the news of our city. It was a truly gorgeous weather day. The game was part of a series of "education days", 11:05 AM game start time, where the Louisville Bats organization invites local schools to attend the game. The fans were rewarded with a bottom of the ninth walk off win, 7-6.

As we proceed in to summer, I ask that all of you join me in acknowledging when you, personally, are tired or need rest. This is one way that we care for ourselves, and the greater work of the church. Weeks like the day after Easter downtown tragedy have a cost. These events tire us in ways that we might not be fully aware of.

I think that ancient Judaism had it right in protecting a Sabbath day. Maybe in our 21st-Century busy world it might look a little different, but I have a strong sense in our go, go, go and do more culture that it might be worth re-investing in as a people and culture.

As a church, in our wanting to do more, and be more, and grow, might we remind ourselves that we are in a lifetime of faith, not a sprint. It truly is a marathon where patience, and kindness to self, and rest aren't an option but a requirement. The Fourth Commandment in Exodus 20:8-10a - "Remember the Sabbath day and keep it holy. Six days you shall labor and do all your work. But the seventh day is a Sabbath to the Lord your God; you shall not do any work." To this day, in Conservative Judaism this is strictly observed with some guidelines. A few examples, walking to temple and not driving, and preparing meals the day before so that little or no energy is spent therein.

It is our charge as a community to care for self and selves. You will have to decide for you what "Sabbath" means in your life. Gone are the days where everything was closed on a Sunday and Wednesday/Thursday evening was church activity night. It is our work, individually and collectively, to define a Sabbath rest need in our own lives. This, too, is a life-long venture. For me, sometimes that looks like the view from the picture below - intentional time to stop-time and to acknowledge some rest.

SESSION MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

- Rev. Eldred commented on the excellent quality of the Lenten programs and the attendance of 85 people at the Easter Sunday service.
- Keith Clements reported that our church received \$62.50 from Mid-Kentucky Presbytery for our 1/8 share of the \$500 runner-up prize from Interfaith Power and Light "Cool Congregation Challenge". This was for the installation of the electrical charging station.
- Marty Hageman said that HCM, shared mission and liability insurance have all been paid for the year. The mechanical repairs to the heating system have totaled \$15,000 this year.
- LLester Gamble reported that the concrete landing on the steps to the office is being repaired. Other planned projects include repairing the roof over the office, installing a mini split HVAC unit in the offices and the kitchen, and restriping the parking lot.
- Sarah Hageman has been working with the youth that has created a positive culture where they look forward to coming to church.
- Congregational Life/Care Committee expressed concerns for Charlie Bensenhaver who has long Covid and Brian Shaw who was in the building when the Old National Bank shootings occurred.
- Alicia and Kris Bloos attended the prayer vigil at Crescent Hill Presbyterian Church to honor the lives lost due to the mass shootings. Our church will contact Mom's Demand Action to inquire how our church can get more involved about gun violence prevention.
- Maddie Vanamburgh will have a high school graduation party in Fellowship Hall on June 3. The church will check on any other graduations to honor.
- Rev. Cheryl Barnes, who spoke to our church on March 26, shared the good news by letter that she will be working as the African Area Coordinator for Presbyterian World Mission in Malawi, Zambia, and Zimbabwe.
- The Bread for the World Sunday will be April 23 with Ed Henson presenting the Minute for Mission. The letters of support for the Farm Bill will be offered on April 30.
- Jennie Guelda, Margot Tomsen, and Bill Bowman attended the CLOUT Nehemiah gathering in March.
 There will be a "town hall" meeting on May 7 after church for the congregation and session to learn about CLOUT's objectives and consider joining. The entrance fee is \$1,500 based on the size of our budget.
- The Session received a letter from Sam and Cynthia Pendergest describing their volunteer work of border ministry in Douglas, AZ, and Mexico. A donation of \$1,000 from the mission bequest fund will be given to Frontera de Cristo for their health and education ministry.
- There will be a Pentecost offering on May 28 with 40% of the offering designated for local youth projects. BRP church's portion will go to Cedar Ridge Camp scholarships.

- Our church has received its Earth Care Congregation certification.
- The Permanent Nominating Committee was asked to select 3 people to be on the Stewardship Committee as well as request suggestions from the congregation for a willing member to serve on the Session for the Class of 2026.
- The Seed Exchange on April 15 was a success and will be integrated with the Farmer's Market next year. The preparing of the Pollinator Garden and grounds clean-up will be April 22 weather permitting.
- The review of the membership will be done in the future, but it was noted that Joe Anne Overstreet has been a member of BRP Church for 80 years as of April 18 and Paul Ray died on the same date.

RIP Medical Debt: We have been asked to be part of the broader Mid-Kentucky Presbytery campaign to raise funds to eliminate the enormous burden of medical debt of many of our fellow neighbors in central Kentucky by partnering with RIP Medical Debt, a highly rated 501c3 charity that specializes in forgiving medical debts.

RIP Medical Debt was founded in 2014 by two former debt collections executives. After decades of working in the for-profit debt-buying industry they eventually realized they were uniquely qualified to help those in need. They imagined a new way to relieve medical debt: use donations to buy large bundles of debt for pennies on the dollar thus erasing debt with no tax consequences to the recipients.

The results have been spectacular:

- To date over \$8 billion in medical debt have been acquired and abolished for over 5 million families
- The respected charity rating service Charity Navigator rated RIP Medical Debt at the highest level: 100% 4-star level.
- Operating expenses are being covered by philanthropic gifts from people like MacKenzie Scott, so 100% of your donation goes directly to debt relief.

RIP's debt abolishment process is transparent and efficient:

- RIP contracts with a hospital or other medical providers. The hospital transmits a patient accounts data file to RIP.
- RIP identifies patients in financial hardship by integrating data from TransUnion Who benefits? Individuals who meet at least one of the two criteria below: 1) those Earning less than 4x the federal poverty level, or 2) those having debts that are 5% percent or more of annual income (it should be Noted: they do not abolish debt by request for specific individuals but only by geographic area)
- RIP buys the medical debt for the provider at a highly discounted rate.
- Families, without any prior awareness, will simply receive a surprise letter from RIP stating their debt has been paid off thanks to this Presbyterian Church effort.

Think about it:

Every \$10 you donate forgives approximately \$1,000 in Medical Debt

Every \$100 you donate forgives approximately \$10,000 in Medical Debt

This campaign is another example, much like the car charging stations, that we are church members who are more interested in helping than in being helped, ...in loving than in being loved, ...in giving than in getting.

FRONTERA DE CRISTO

Many BRP members will remember Sam and Cynthia Pendergast from around 40 years ago. Sam was a student at Louisville Seminary, and he and Cynthia spent many enjoyable hours with the youth group of that time. After a career in ministry at a Presbyterian church in upstate New York, Sam retired last year, and one of the first things he and Cynthia have done is move to the southern US border to work with a nonprofit called Frontera de Cristo. This is a border ministry of the Presbyterian Church (USA), working to assist migrants and others living in Mexico, just south of the US border.

The Mission Committee has recommended, and Session has approved, sending \$1,000 from our Mission Bequest Fund, to help Sam and Cynthia at Frontera de Cristo. We look forward for more news from our friends as they spend this entire calendar year working in ministry with those in need.

CLOUT

CLOUT (Citizens of Louisville Organized and United Together) is an organization of churches in the metro area addressing community issues of importance to our citizens. Recent examples of their activities include plans for a "Louisville Village" to help older adults remain independent in their homes, working for gun violence reduction, improved policing and intervention with those in crisis, and helping students in JCPS improve their reading proficiency.


