Many of you may remember Rev. Dr. Dick Teaford, the tenth called and installed pastor of BRPres, who was also from Iowa. Some cultures believe that birds have messages attached to their appearances. Notable to Louisville, did you know that in some cultures seeing a Cardinal is an acknowledgement of someone gone on to God's great triumph in this life appearing in spirit's presence through the Cardinal. A wonderful thing to think about being Louisvillians.

The second photo is that of a bee house. These are mini mounted bee houses that some bees will actually utilize for winter. It is said they can take two and three years to fully take on. I believe that Jennie Guelda brought these to the church. If you look closely the little holes of the cork like material in the house have been filled up with pollen. Certain bees will live behind that pollen, sheltered from the winter temperatures, and the pollen will sustain them through the winter to spring where they will emerge from their more dormant state back outside.

We are at the crux of summer -the point where the days start to get shorter and the time to fall lessens. I ask that you enjoy these last weeks of summer. Get some rest. Enjoy the outdoors. Go for a walk. Pay attention to our earth and the nature around us. We have an abundant fall, winter, and spring ahead as a church. 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SESSION HIGHLIGHTS JUNE 2023

Rev. Elder thanked Keith Clements for his three year service as Clerk of Session. He also thanked Anne Campbell and Clare Lewis for their service. He welcomed Clare Lewis back for an additional term, and Paul Johnson and Molly Rapp to the Class of 2026. Molly Rapp was appointed Clerk of Session.

Marty Hageman and Doug Rapp gave the treasurer's report and distributed budget packets to committee chairs. He reviewed the line items they were responsible for in the budget. He also reviewed the church investment accounts and addressed questions. A love gift was received from the Louisville Home School.

The Building and Grounds committee is exploring options for an expanded role for the Sexton position. Numerous projects will take place in the coming weeks, including air conditioner replacement, roof repairs, carpet cleaning, flooring and wall work, and preparation of rooms for Home School use.

The VBS day of service and fellowship with IUCC is July 16th at Des Pres Park. Rev. Elder and Sarah Hageman will be sharing more specific information about Sunday School, Fall curriculum, and faith study. A program for adults is also being planned.

Bill Bowman led a discussion about CLOUT membership. The session approved a one year membership in CLOUT. Carol Brees delivered letters in support of the Farm Bill.

Rev. Eldred reported a request made to consider hosting The World Day of Prayer in March 2024. This will be discussed further at the August session meeting. The Outreach and Communications committees will be merging. Neighborfest is Saturday, September 16th.

There will be a called meeting of the session at 10:15 on Sunday, August 6th. New members will join, and confirmation will occur during worship on Sunday, August 6th. The session Elder Retreat will be held following worship on August 6th.




VBS 2023


We are grateful for the youth and adults who participated so willingly in our service projects. We are blessed to work so well with our friends at IUCC, and it was very successful day!

BATTERIES AND...

We will be collecting household batteries again this summer, to deliver them to the Hazardous Waste facility in the fall. Please collect your batteries--from flashlights, hearing aids, remote controls, toys, and other household gadgets--and bring them into the church in the next couple of months. There is a container in the rear of the sanctuary for your convenience.

We've also discovered that **mercury thermometers** can be recycled at the same facility, so add those thermometers to the things you'd like to recycle, and we'll get them taken care of. Just like batteries, thermometers should not be thrown in the trash due to the heavy metals they contain.

As Your BRP representative, I recently attended my first CLOUT Board meeting. I am sure that the church could of had someone better than this ADHD lad, nonetheless, I persevered and learned a little something about this organization which we voted to align ourselves with - CLOUT (Citizens of Louisville Organized and United Together).

Working since 1991, CLOUT has sought to solve many of Louisville's problems by uniting different Religious organizations to work united on social issues of common concern. CLOUT's vision is a city of justice where its systems assure that all people are treated fairly.

In this, my first meeting, I was honored to meet a number of people from across Louisville, from poor religious communities to those of wealthier religious communities. I was impressed to see the respect and decency shown amongst the board members, even when they disagreed.

Their passionate respectful arguments have bourn much good works in the past 25 years since their inception. From their "Open the Door" campaign that led to millions of dollars for the Louisville Metro Affordable Housing Trust Fund, or their fight for the "Louisville Village" where CLOUT's research revealed that older adults in Louisville are often forced to leave their homes and enter an institution, due to a lack of knowledge, or access to affordable services and programs for maintaining their homes and meeting their basic needs.

This last Spring CLOUT finally launched the Louisville Village and it is working to help the aged of our community stay in their homes secure.

With my job teaching Reading and Comprehension, I was duly impressed that CLOUT has recently taken on the poor reading performance in our JCPS school system. Research shows that there is a clear connection between the inability to read, and societies problems of crime, violence, and mental health. 65% of our students born in poverty are testing below their grade level in reading, thus our problems as a society are only beginning. Despite my many inadequacies, and my aversion to sitting through long discussions, I'm proud to be my Church Familiy's representative to Clout. An organization which, in this short missive, I have barely touched upon the many noble programs that they are effectively fighting for. Perhaps in the future I can speak more upon the many social ills which they, and now WE are working to solve. Many Blessings to One and All
